

Please join our team of wonderful people who are vital to the smooth running of the Cottage. The current executive is very happy to discuss these roles.


While taking on a new Cottage role requires some time and effort, it also fosters new friendships, keeps your brain active and enables the Cottage to continue giving joy to members and visitors.

Tribute to Carole Parsons



It is with great sadness we write that Carol Parsons has passed away.

To know her was to love her. Such is Carole's legacy and her name will remain synonymous with the notable successes of Buderim Craft Cottage.

Carole first joined the pottery group in 1976, after moving from Sydney where she learned the art.

Known as a 'mover and shaker', Carole's

effervescent zest for life and her characteristic straightforward approach endeared her to all. She was a natural leader and her magnetism drove many collaborative projects that the Cottage is proud of.

She served two terms as President of the Cottage and was also Secretary for many years. Carole presided over building renovations, alterations and additions required to accommodate a growing membership, which today tops 350. She was accorded the honour of Life Membership.

From 1993 until her retirement in 2016, Carole led the Pottery Group with gusto, compassion and dedication to the job at hand. An accomplished potter herself, her works hold pride of place in many Queensland homes and gardens, and her work is also on display in the Cottage Garden.

We remember Carole for the important role she played in planning and building the iconic pieces in the Cottage gardens, including:

- the ornate double-sided cottage bench inspired by her trip to Barcelona, Spain
- the three totem poles made to commemorate the new millennium, and featuring 'The Family Tree of Life', 'From the Mountains to the Sea' and 'The Spirit of Buderim Craft Cottage'
- the mural on the wall of the Buderim library, surrounded by a memorial garden that features red and white flowers depicting 100 years of the Anzacs.

Most importantly, we remember a warm, talented and fun-loving lady, who was a lifelong friend to many, and who unselfishly shared of herself, while embracing life with every grain of her being.

Carole's legacy

The recent passing of Carole Parsons has given rise to happy recollections of her many achievements, not least of which, is the bench that claims pride of place adjacent to the Cottage verandah.

Carole first suggested the idea after a holiday trip to Barcelona where she was smitten by the works of architect Antoni Gaudi.

Together with support and inspiration from many people, there was no stopping this major project. Pam Thomas and Carole drove the project with passion and inspiration.

Josie, took pencil to paper and etched the formative design that incorporates Buderim's flora and fauna – and the Cottage's then-resident python.

Another Life Member, David Neilsen built the solid, heavily reinforced frame with clinker bricks. Jan Nelson played a role in the selection of glazes. Deidre, Karel and Judy were also contributing artists and continue to lead and motivate others today.

Art, Calligraphy and Papercraft

The Pointed Nib

Calligraphic possibilities are endless and after six months of working with a broad-edge nib, the Calligraphy & Papercraft Group has swapped for the pointed nib.

For those who love a little technical detail, the broad edge nib is rigid and has a flat edge which comes in varying widths.

The pointed nib is flexible - some pointed nibs flex just a little and some have a beautiful 'bounce'. The pointed nib ends with a sharp point as opposed to a broad edge.

Generally, we don't start the beginner calligrapher with a pointed nib, as it requires a lot of technical ability and 'feel' to understand the pressure required for thicker and thinner strokes. Very fine hairline strokes are made on the upward strokes using a light touch and downward strokes produce a thicker line using a heavier touch.

Our valued volunteer – Karel Beech

The Cottage is a family tradition for Karel. Her mother Margaret Goldsworthy, sister Deidre Phipps and Godmother Carole Parsons, were already in the Pottery group when she joined. "Back then, the Cottage had quite a few families attending" Karel reflected.

A few years after joining, Karel would come into the Cottage on a Thursday to empty the kilns and have morning tea with the Yarns & Fibres group – a group which she then joined and subsequently lead.

She took on the Group Leader role for 10 years before Maxine Saunders, the current Yarns & Fibres Group Leader.

Karel always kept busy with many other roles for the Cottage.

For several years, she edited the Cottage's newsletter and also had a 10-year stint as Coordinator of the Easter and Christmas Fairs saying, "the Fairs do wonderfully well because of the amount of talent at the Cottage" added Karel.

Karel is currently the group leader of the *Atrium* Group and also keeps her creativity going with fibre art and pottery.

Karel's work can be seen in the Atrium and during the Pottery Exhibition from 7-15 October 2023.








It is positive to see members sharing their experiences from the various workshops with other group members and applying some new techniques to their own work.

The Mixed Media Group has organised peer-led internal workshops to for the first Thursday of each month. Coloured pencil techniques is the next workshop on Thursday 7th September. Upcoming sessions will include Zentangle, Neurographic Art and Lino Block Printing.

Planning by the Mixed Media Events Committee is well underway for the group's Off-the-Shelf event, which will be held late in September.

The Mixed Media group is busily preparing a wide range of works and will demonstrate art-in-action by several artists in residence throughout the event. The kitchen will also be open on Saturday and Sunday, offering delicious treats with tea or coffee.

Other group activities included learning to use soy wax as a dye resist on fabric; using rusted objects to dye patterns on both paper and fabric; and we used imprints of plants and leaves to dye paper and fabric.



Around 470 patchworkers and interested locals visited the Cottage during the Patchwork Exhibition in June.

It was a fabulous event where members and visitors enjoyed viewing the many quilts and patchwork creations on display, with many visitors remarking how uplifted they felt looking at the wonderful mixture of colours in the various quilts.

During Covid, social distancing requirements meant we had to allow more space between the quilts on show and many visitors commented how it improved the viewing experience.

This year, we again allowed more space between the quilts, enabling visitors to better appreciate the works from wider angles.

Giving the exhibits 'more air' allowed them to be viewed to best effect, especially those with complex or impressionist patterns which are best appreciated from a distance.

Yola Webster's 'Aussie Animals' was voted favourite quilt by our visitors. Yola's creation, the 'Harlequin Cat', also won the 2023 Lyn Ballinger Challenge'.

The Queensland Quilters have put together a Travelling Trunk Show of quilts and are visiting their affiliated groups during 2023-2024.

We are organising for them to visit our group during September. They will have between 60-100 quilts of all genres covering Traditional, Art, Modern and some Challenge Quilts.

We invite all our members to visit the Cottage in September to see the array of 'visiting' quilts.

During the Patchwork Exhibition, our raffle quilt raised \$2,000 for the Maroochydore <u>sleepbus</u> and was won by a local resident.

<u>Uniforms 4 Kids</u> is a program that takes unwanted law enforcement and emergency services organisations' uniforms, and turns them into beautiful and unique clothes for children in need.

Sue Andrew often sits during our patchwork meetings, unpicking these unwanted uniforms. In August, she organised a community sewing day to make two predominantly blue quilts from 50% donated patchwork fabric and 50% unpicked police uniforms.

Perhaps next community sewing day we will blend the blue with green, or maybe make something with orange (Sue was unpicking SES uniforms recently).

If you have any suitable patchwork fabric that you would like to donate please bring it to the cottage on a Wednesday afternoon clearly marked that it is for patchwork's use.

We had some sad news with the passing of Ailsa Ash, a much-loved patchworker, who joined the Cottage in August, 1996.

Ailsa had been ill for several months and passed away in July. She was 89. At her funeral, her family spoke of the wonderful life she had enjoyed and of the volunteering work she did with Rotary, which earned her a special award.

Her grandchildren spoke of her love of patchwork and of all the quilts, now more precious, that she made for them and the family. Farewell Ailsa -you will be fondly remembered.
