A fresh coat of paint was given to the toilet rooms and Studio North in January. A roof repair and an external power point to connect the new strip lighting in the courtyard was also installed in January.

There is a wealth of written information and previous WS volunteers are available for a handover process. It takes a lot of forward planning and, unfortunately, if these positions are not filled by the end of March, the 2025 WS may have to be cancelled.

One young visitor attending the exhibition with his artist grandmother declared it, 'the best in the show' and wanted to take it home.


Grandma's entries didn't get a mention. When Angus returned to collect his painting after the exhibition was closed, he brought his 'art portfolio' along to show me.


Do you have a favourite anote?

# How I Became a Calligrapher: by Roz Bull

Pen Ultimate is a wonderful name for a shop selling pens, fine paper and ink.

Catalogues were attractively arranged on a chair at the front door. As I drew closer, the proprietor saw me and encouraged me into his tiny Sydney shop.

Curtis was an exotic creature. Late twenties, of Bosnian heritage, his grandmother having migrated many years earlier, he reigned supreme in his domain.

He was dressed immaculately in a suit, waistcoat and bow tie. Certainly a devotee of the finer things of life, he appeared to have just stepped from another time where fast communications have no place.

He would look appropriate on the TV series "Selfridges". Curtis was having his morning cup of tea when I stepped into his life.

On a silver tray was an exquisite China set for one person, consisting of teapot, cup and saucer, sugar bowl and milk jug.

Prominently displayed was a book titled *Improving Your Penmanship*. It was written by the owner of Pen Ultimate, a lady who was once a letter writer for Queen Elizabeth II.

For many years, I had wanted to improve my handwriting. Opportunity beckoned.

Curtis was conversant with the history of letter writing and seemed to be guarding this fine tradition against the assault of the modern world.

He writes a dozen letters a fortnight with carefully practiced penmanship which is so attractive that I have kept his handwritten receipt. Perhaps he could show me some paper?

Curtis carefully took paper from its presentation package, lovingly caressing it as he did so, in the same way I have seen my brother, a woodworker, caressing a piece of particularly fine wood. The paper was white and of superb quality. I thought it looked austere.

I use a lot of cards for letter writing, and for writing birthday, sympathy and thank you letters my preference being for cards with an attractive design on the front similar to a greeting card.

Appropriate cards for this purpose have become scarce and I have recently been looking in vain.

On mentioning this, from the top shelf Curtis took a music box of just such cards. Perhaps they had been there for some time. They were not dusty. Nothing is dusty in Pen Ultimate.

The music from the box was Beethoven's "Ode to Joy". How appropriate. It was just how I was feeling!

No items in Pen Ultimate have a discount sticker but, as I examined the box, Curtis said he could "let me have it" for what was a significant discount. Sold!

I bid farewell and stepped out of the shop and into the 21st century.

Several days later, ready to begin the task of improving my handwriting, I returned and bought a pen.

It was then I noticed how some ink bottles have a sloping base which allows them to lean towards the writer making it easier to dip the nib or quill.

Inks come in all colours, even mauve and turquoise. However, Curtis recommended that for me the blue would be the most appropriate and who am I to disagree with the master?

Back at the Sunshine Coast, I wasted no time in contacting the Calligraphy & Papercraft Group at Buderim Craft Cottage.


There, stretched out before me were fascinating scripts, beautiful metallic inks, amazing nibs from all over the world and a history of calligraphy stretching back for centuries.

Best of all, the group was friendly and helpful. I had found my tribe

### Machine Embroidery and Machine Sewing

The Machine
Embroidery Group,
which has been
operating at the
Cottage since 2008,
has seen the craft
change quite a bit
over the years.

While our sewers use specialized machines, the embroidery designs have improved dramatically over the years and become more creative with more 'In the Hoop' designs.

Now we can sew more than embroidered squares turning them into bags, cushions, placemats, quilts and clothing trims.

Who would have thought that we can now make a complete bag with inserted zipper in an embroidery project. Not only that, we can embroidery on leather, felt, rope bowls and even cork fabric.

We even have talented members who digitize and, design their own stitcheries and turn them into a machine embroidery file.

Key in the design, hoop up your stabilizer and fabric, put it into the machine, press go, then have a cuppa and a chat whilst the machine does all the work.

wendy's Christmas Table runner too, has been completely sewn 'In the Hoop' with a flip and stitch method. The only thing sewn on a normal machine setting is a sewing stitch to attach the binding around the edge.
