

got you and was immediately your friend and mentor.

Timing really is everything. I was at the Cottage a few weeks ago and the phone rang and a lovely gentlemen asked if he could have Jan Gradys details as he wanted to get in touch with her. I did not know what he wanted, so I asked if I could help. He told me, he had just had a significant birthday and was wanting to talk to Jan and let her know what an impact she had made in his life. She had been his teacher many many years ago and he wanted to thank her for being so inspirational to him. He wanted to thank Jan for being Jan.



Jan Nelson remembers fondly Jan's beloved Morris Minor. Jan found it in New Zealand and as it was from the 1960's or earlier, so it needed some TLC and a fresh coat of baby blue paint. Jan shipped it back to Australia and was an active member of the local Morris Minor club. No power steering, air conditioning or electric windows...but Jan loved that car.

She also had a love of sunglasses – especially Pink Flamingo sunnies. She was flamboyant,



glamourous, entertaining, generous and we all miss her dearly.

Jan's much loved husband Len was also often seen around the Cottage. If there was a job to be done, he would be among the first of the "Cottage husbands" to put his hand up.

The bequeathment that Jan left to the Cottage has been used to install air conditioning in the main work room and the Atrium. We are so thankful for this kindness

from Jan. When we work comfortably in the main work room creating something beautiful, we remember that a beautiful friend has given this to us.

#### VALUED VOLUNTEER: SOLÉ PAEZ





Solé Paez had early strong an interest in computers and design. graphic Her life story has also led her to marketing work and caring for members of the community.

A major reason the community has up to date information about Buderim Craft Cottage's (BCC) groups, exhibitions, fairs, workshops and newsletters is due to the postings Solé has made over the last three years on BCC's Website, Facebook and Instagram. This year Solé sent information about BCC's Winter School to community groups from Brisbane to Gympie and from the Sunshine Coast to the hinterland. This resulted in a higher enrolment of workshop participants from the community than in the past.

We've been very fortunate to have Solé join the Buderim Craft Cottage in 2022. Shortly after she became a member, then-Secretary May Carson noticed her skills and interests on her application—just as the Cottage was seeking a Web Master and Social Media Administrator—and reached out to her during her first week. In 2024, Solé also stepped into the role of BCC Newsletter Editor.

I interviewed Solé on 22nd October this year and here is her story:

Solé was born in Rancagua, Chile, and lived there for 18 years. She moved to Santiago to study Mathematics & Computer Systems at "Universidad Tecnica del Estado". In 1978 she married and moved back to Rancagua as her husband, Wilson, a mining engineer, had a job there in the world's largest underground copper mine. 1979 and 1981 saw the birth of her two sons. In 1982, eager to advance his career, Wilson and Solé set their sights on new opportunities

and applied to migrate to seven different countries for work.

Australia was the first to respond, and within six months they had moved. They left Chile on March 6, 1983, and arrived in Sydney on March 8, on the eve of Bob Hawke's first term in government. It was 15 degrees when they departed Chile, and 47 degrees when they reached Villawood Hostel—a temporary housing facility where 49 languages were spoken—with no airconditioning to cope with the heat. The



children played in the bathtub and lay on the cool tiles. That day was burned into Solé's memory.

During her time in Sydney, Solé studied English, worked as a cleaner, crocheted, set up a home, completed a Diploma in Beauty Therapy, worked at a salon and sponsored her mother, father, sister and brother to come to live and work in Australia. Wilson also began working as a cleaner; However, he later became a store manager in a shoe factory. He never returned to engineering due to the challenges he faced with the English language.

After visiting friends in Mooloolaba in 1987, Solé and Wilson, along with her extended family, moved to Maroochydore in 1989. Solé's father — a cabinetmaker by trade — opened a small factory in Maroochydore as a family business, and

her mother — a dressmaker by trade — began working for a leather garment factory based in Cooloolabin. They both attended the Eumundi Markets to sell their crafts until 1995. Solé, Wilson, their children, and Solé's sister and husband returned to Sydney at the end of 1990.

Solé moved back to the Sunshine Coast in early 1991, now divorced, and her children attended Kuluin State School and later

Maroochydore High School.



Solé Paez was the first student to enrol at the University of the Sunshine Coast (USC). She was the first person to register when the university's Maroochydore office opened in 1995—an event an early

administrator described as a momentous milestone in the birth of the new institution. Solé completed her Bachelor of Business, Marketing & Graphic Design degree in 1999, and graduated in April 2000.

From 1997 to 2004, Solé worked in various roles at USC: Administrative Assistant to the Dean of Business; Tutor in Marketing Theory & Practice, International Marketing, Information & Technology, and Adobe Photoshop. She also worked in the IT department managing MBA (Master of Business Administration) video production, which was sent to overseas students in Fiji, China, and Malaysia.

In 2004 Solé opened her own business and worked as a freelancer in Webpage development and graphic design.

Solé's career shifted direction between 2010 and 2015, when she worked as the Marketing & Fundraising Manager for Lifeline Queensland's regional office—a fast-paced role focused on raising funds and promoting Lifeline's services, including suicide prevention and a range of other counselling programs. Her responsibilities

also extended to promoting all 13 Lifeline Shops across the region and coordinating various awareness events to keep Lifeline's services visible and present in the community.

After 2015, Solé returned to freelancing, this time under the business name "All Media Services." Later, seeking a fresh direction, she completed a Nurse Assistant course, which opened the door to work in Aged Care from 2018 to 2022. She reflected, "Working in aged care helped me realise how much I enjoy caring for others." She eventually retired after a night-shift accident resulted in a severe shoulder and neck injury.

Solé first came to Buderim Craft Cottage in 2012 and approached the President to ask if a Photography group could be formed as there wasn't one at the Cottage at that time. One was subsequently started sometime later, but Solé was not aware of this. Fast forward to 2022, it was when Solé met BCC member Penny Kasteel at the Anglican Church Friday night market, that Solé decided to come along to the BCC's Patchwork group and became a member.

Solé enjoys a wide range of creative pursuits



and has been involved several Cottage groups, though she now regularly attends Mixed Media Yarns & Fibres. When talking about her art, she explains, always out of the box! I love combining mediums like cement, crochet, stones. pencils, paint, fabric, metal, and more."

Her passion for photography remains strong—"I just can't escape from it!" she says. Between 2004 and now, Solé has had her photographs featured in multiple international exhibitions, and she previously won the Maroochy Shire Council Photography Award in 2005. Solé loves the mindfulness of art and finds it relaxing. Frida

She loves the way group gatherings encourage the exchange of artistic ideas, personal stories, and creative achievements—something that often inspires others to join.

The group was treated to a workshop on the craft of iris folding, led by Cathie Twaddle who created a happy hum in the Main Workroom with her Iris Folding Card Workshop. The technique involves folding paper strips and arranging them over a template to create a layered, dimensional effect. It was a delight to watch the looks of surprise as participants flipped over their completed Iris





Fold designs to reveal beautiful designs. Also joining us was Yvonne from the Fibre Arts and Surface Design. Many thanks to Cathie for a great workshop.

Two of our members had very special birthdays, Yvonne's 90th and John's 80th. The group celebrated our wonderful members in style with a sumptuous morning tea. Annie Felton introduced the group to an 'Experimenting with Embossing' workshop, using an embossing machine and special folders, along with some gilding effects.



Embossing is a process that creates raised or recessed patterns on the surface of paper, card and other materials. It involves pressing a die or mold into the material to create a three-dimensional effect. The star is embossed paper patchwork and the butterflies are the result of ink being applied to an embossing folder. Many thanks to Annie for her brilliance and creativity.

From Monday 5th to Friday 9th January 2026 we are delighted to announce that our guest tutor will be Julie Williams, calligrapher, lettering artist, maker of artist books and painter, coming to us from Sydney.
