

A Code of Conduct and Internal Grievance Procedures

At the most recent Management Committee meeting, the following Code of Conduct was adopted.

- CODE OF CONDUCT FOR MEETINGS OF GROUPS AND MANAGEMENT Speak openly and listen attentively.
 - *Turn-take in group discussion—avoid private side-line conversations and cross-talk.*
 - Be respectful of the points of view of others, and mindful of confidentiality.

Be flexible and open to new ideas.

Make decisions that serve the interests of the Buderim Craft Cottage overall—avoid outcomes that advantage an individual member or individual group only to the detriment of other members and groups.

This Code of Conduct is very simply stated, and generally, already enacted by our members. Some might think that it is not necessary for Buderim Craft Cottage.

Not so. A Code of Conduct is an important statement. First, it describes an important aspect of our Association's culture—that we value open and respectful communication. Second, it underpins the manner in which we approach handling any internal grievances.

Consideration of a Code of Conduct occurred because our legislative body, the Office of Fair Trading, is currently devising guidelines by which incorporated associations manage internal grievances. When published, our Association will be obliged to incorporate an internal grievance procedure consistent with these guidelines into Cottage rules and policies. We will be off to a great start in this process with our Code of Conduct.

Activity around the Cottage

There will be some maintenance tasks happening soon. I thank you for being patient should any disruption to our weekly activities occur. I will try to forewarn you if disruption is anticipated. These tasks include upgrading electrical safety switches, some roof and guttering maintenance, and installation of new gutter guard.

As she transformed a blank plate into a "collectible", we learned that you can happily "splosh and squish" underglaze while dismissing something that doesn't turn out quite as expected as a "bleerkie"!

A swall group of textile artists from NSW and Qid browelled with Barbara Schey to Japan The Shiban Symposium was held in Tokyo which enabled us te visit factories to observe silk dying and weaving, both traditional and modern. Museum visits gave us an insight into culture and fashion

Some aspects of the culture and beauty of Japan have been illustrated by using dyes on slik and free motion machine stitching to enhance the texture. Textile pens have been used to draw features and add detail where necessary. A geisha girl, children flying kites and Mount 9u ji bring strong memories of Japa

Now we are back to doing something ourselves , Shibori Dyeing . Preparation for Design was led by Sue with indigo Dyeing next week.


